Christopher Gates of Goodwill Industries of East Texas was recognized by WorkQuest with the 2025 Artie Lee Hinds Award. The award honors an outstanding Community Rehabilitation Program (CRP) employee for leadership, dedicated service and commitment to excellence.

Gates began his journey at Goodwill Industries of East Texas six years ago and now plays an integral role on a variety of contracts through the *Works Wonders* Program. His responsibilities include boxing wipes, assembling hardware and contributing to other projects throughout the facility as needed. His reliability and versatility have made him an invaluable part of the team.

Ron Ellis, production manager at Goodwill Industries of East Texas, sees Gates as more than just a hardworking employee—he's a source of joy and inspiration.

"Chris is inquisitive, he's attentive, and he always has a smile," Ellis said. "He's one of the kinds of people that when you see him, you feel better."

That positive energy extends throughout the workplace. Gates' upbeat attitude and eagerness to learn has made a lasting impression on both staff and fellow employees. His presence is felt in every room he walks into, whether he's asking thoughtful questions, sharing a story or encouraging his team. His growth since joining the organization has been notable, particularly in the ways he embraces new challenges.

"Chris has gone from being sheltered and shy about what he can do about his abilities to 'okay, let me try that," Ruth Davis, director at Goodwill Industries of East Texas, said. "Any new project that we give

him now he's willing to try, so I've definitely seen his confidence soar and his abilities increase as well."

"I want to feel included and want to do what everybody else does. Goodwill makes me feel that way," Gates said. "I feel like I can do what everyone else does, and I feel very included in all the jobs they have around here."

"Chris' job at Goodwill has been such a benefit to our family because he's contributing to our household and he's teaching our kids how to live with people that have special needs," Chris' sister Marie Leu, said.

Gates is not only respected for his strong work ethic and attitude but is admired for his ability to take on multiple tasks with focus and enthusiasm. His story represents what is possible when people are given the opportunity to thrive in a supportive and inclusive environment.

## WorkQuest hosts 37th annual Products and Services Expo



On Sept. 23, 2025, WorkQuest hosted its 37th annual Products and Services Expo, connecting Community Rehabilitation Program (CRP) partners with customers from across Texas. The event serves as a showcase for CRPs to display their products and highlight the services they offer through the State Use *WorksWonders* Program—a program that helps Texans with disabilities find meaningful employment opportunities.

With CRPs and customers operating across Texas, the Products and Services Expo stands out as a vital annual gathering point. For many CRPs, it's the one time each year they meet directly with customers, providing a valuable opportunity to promote their products and services and build relationships that can lead to future business.



"This expo remains an important once-a-year-event that allows many new purchasers to come and discover all the products and services," Myles Wallace, disability inclusion partner at Peak Performers, said. "It's a nice way to meet people who may be using staffing services and realize that they are making a real difference."

Participation in the *WorksWonders* Program and inclusion in the WorkQuest catalog not only increases visibility for CRPs but also expands employment opportunities for individuals with disabilities.

"The expo provides us with an opportunity to touch base with different customers and all the different state agencies," Scott Baker, vice president of sales and strategic partnerships at Envision Dallas, said. "It's a super worthy opportunity for us to help put hundreds of people to work in our community."



That sense of mission was echoed by others in attendance. Many CRP representatives expressed their appreciation for WorkQuest's continued support, noting how instrumental the organization has been in helping them grow their business and fulfill their purpose.

"It's so important to at least once a year be face to face with these folks," Todd Potoczak, contract sales representative at Goodwill Industries of East Texas, said. "We benefit from our partnership with WorkQuest and with East Texas Lighthouse for the Blind, and being together reminds us of the real impact this work has on people's lives and the communities we serve."

Attendees praised the convenience of the Expo and the opportunity it provides to discover new products and services that align with their organization's needs. As CRPs and purchasers look ahead, the relationships and ideas sparked at the Expo will shape the future of meaningful opportunities for individuals with disabilities.
